#### **School Presentation to the Board: Divisional Priorities**

**School:** High Level Public School Date of Report: October 11, 2023

#### **School Context:**

High Level Public School is a diverse and inclusive educational institution serving students in grades 7 to 12 in the community of High Level.

HLPS accommodates a student body of 500 students, representing various cultural and socioeconomic backgrounds. The school places a strong emphasis on high-quality instruction, ensuring that students acquire the knowledge and skills necessary for their post-high school goals. High Level Public School is committed to improving student performance, particularly in literacy and numeracy. It acknowledges that students have a wide range of skill levels, necessitating small group instruction and evidence-based interventions to address learning gaps and provide additional support.

High Level Public School places significant importance on the well-being of its students and on fostering positive connections among students and staff. Admin and staff collaborate with the Connection Team to provide mental health support and universal programming to address mental health concerns.

High Level Public School is actively working on strengthening relationships with families and community organizations. This community engagement is important for creating a holistic educational experience and ensuring that the school is an integral part of the larger community. In summary, High Level Public School is focused on providing a well-rounded education that includes academic excellence, social well-being, and community involvement. The school's commitment to addressing individual learning needs and providing mental health support underscores its dedication to the success and overall well-being of its students.

#### Celebration:

Reading fluency is our strongest area, with all grade levels showing growth from Fall of 2022 to Fall of 2023

Grade 8 and 9 classes saw greatest growth in Reading Comprehension from Fall of 2022 to Fall of 2023 (Spring 2023 for grade 9 students)

#### Growth Area:

Comprehension is the area in need of growth. 40 students (22%) currently below average in Comprehension. Grade 7 class has 30% below average in comprehension.

#### **Numeracy:**

All grade levels improved from Fall 2022 to Fall 2023.

Fall 2022 63.8% of students at or above average.

Grade 8 class improved from 63.3% (Fall 2022) at or above average to 70.3% (Fall 2023) Grade 9 class improved from 74.6% (Fall 2022) at or above average to 79.3% (Fall 2023) Grade 10 class improved from 55% (Fall 2022) at or above average to 74% (Fall 2023)

Grade 7 class has 48% of students (31 students) below average on WRAT. Two new teachers this year in grade 7.

Increased number of choices per grade and allow students to repeat choices for further exploration and skill development. This has resulted in greater engagement and purpose for CTF.

Created several partnerships with the community for Apprenticeship and Career Internships for students.


## **Focus on the Priorities**

Submitted by Karen Smith









- FVSD staff support-Willard, Natasha and Amanda have all been busy providing services to our staff, and in some cases their spouses. We have very few staff accessing the supports through Ink Blot, but I am working with ASEBP on a plan for next year. Natasha comes north once/month for four days (2 days in High Level and 2 days in La Crete) and Amanda comes north one weekend/month to High Level. Natasha and Amanda have been completely booked every visit. Willard is building up his clientele post-heart surgery, but he continues to provide excellent clinical supervision to our MHT team.
- All schools have aligned their connectivity goal in their Assurance Plan to build meaningful community connections. Many schools have developed goals to ensure their staff develop a sound understanding of community context (norms, values, and beliefs).
- We are organizing a mini-mental health summit for our November 10<sup>th</sup> PD. We are working with NRLC and will offer our Zone 1 counterparts the opportunity to join this day virtually. We will have expert speakers present in the areas of supporting youth through anxiety, dealing with difficult personalities, and selfcare.

# Numeracy

Gilbert Morris

- The focus this past year was establishing interventions at the grade 2-4 levels, developing curriculum support resources, revising grades 4-6 common assessments to reflect new curriculum, and working with school administrators to improve their understanding of effective instructional practices that are research-based.
- WRAT 5 (Wide Range Achievement Test) Division Measure for Gr. 1-9 (norm referenced and standardized).
- Overall: In the fall of 2022 we had 35.1% of grade 2-9 students average or above on the WRAT5 and 51% of our grade 1-9 students average or above in the winter of 2023. In the spring of 2023, we had 57.5% [Target 75%] of our grade 1-9 students scoring average or above. A 22.4 % increase over the course of the school year. The following table shows the growth for each grade level over the course of the school year:

For the 2023-2024 school year, plans are in place to establish:

- Numeracy Coaches Each school will have a 0.25 FTE Numeracy Coach that will work with math teachers to improve content knowledge and the delivery of content.
- Interventions for grades 5-8.
- Procuring print resources and digital resources that not only align to the new curriculum, but also have pedagogical practices that develop the student's understanding of mathematical concepts (conceptual understanding), rather than just procedures.

\*Data includes all students, even those on IPPs (Individualized Program Plans). Overall, we see gains in Decoding, Fluency and Comprehension. In almost all schools we see the percentage of students above average increase in the higher divisions. In our ELL schools, we see significant gains in Division 2 and 3. High Schools like LCPS and HLPS see fewer students requiring interventions, we no longer need to run Empower at LCPS and have no pull-out interventions at this time, as opposed to many interventions our first two years.

#### **Observation of Data:**

Over the course of the year schools were focused on a commitment to high-quality literacy instruction. Principals saw this as the shared responsibility of all educators and teachers to work collaboratively to identify explicit and implicit literacy expectations to support learning.

There was a focus on foundational literacy skills that include the daily teaching of Phonemic Awareness and Phonics.

Overall, we do see gains in Decoding and have identified Comprehension as an area of focus for the following year.

Overall, we do see an increase in the percentage of students reading in the average range, we see less students requiring reading interventions; however, we do see more students coming into the school in higher grades that do not know how to read and have not been in school for a few years.

In our first year, the average and above was in the 50's, where now we are up in the high 60's, 70's. Fewer students going into Junior High are unable to decode and read. Work needs to be done with Comprehension and Vocabulary.

#### **Planning for Success:**

- -Teachers have been working with the new curriculum, developing competence in the teaching of Phonics, Phonemic Awareness and Word Work. What we are seeing a need for, is reading programs, more books, more daily reading and time to read. -
- -We need to develop a model to train new teachers in how to teach reading. With new teachers coming in each year, we do not have a system in place that will sustain practice, school to school on a yearly basis. Though we have a framework, we need to identify who will be doing the training.
- We are providing support and training for coaches in schools with the Implementation of Content Coaching and a new model of coaching in schools.
- Principals have been asked to ensure that schoolwide reading and writing programs are running in classrooms.
- -Schools have embraced the Science of Reading, with a focus on foundational skills. Vocabulary and Comprehension/Reading programs/writing programs need to be implemented with consistency.
- We are training more teachers in the Empower Comprehension and Vocabulary program. At Florence MacDougal, we did not have the need to run more decoding interventions, which was good to see. Schools are moving away from running too many interventions, limiting pull out by implementing quality universal programming.
- Grade 4/5 Reading Research-Buffalo Head and Spirit of the North
- We have committed to five days of ELA support for Junior High-4 Days of Junior High Professional Development with Tannis Nizoli

-Teachers have identified Vocabulary and Reading Strategies as an area of learning.
